<u>Note</u>: The first Parish Meeting to elect councillors was held on 4 December at the Boys' School, Little Stanmore, with Mr. Charles E.C. Prichard in the Chair during the election. About 45 voters were present.

A poll was demanded, with Cornwell and Preston not proceeding to the poll. The poll resulted in the election of Garrett, Mair and Davies in place of Goddard, Cliff and Cheshire. In view of the number of votes polled by Cardo, the turnout at this election was at least 57.1%.

The *Hendon and Finchley Times* reported on this election as follows: "The poll [aroused] considerable interest in the village. Mr. D.R. Soames was the presiding officer, and by midday about 50 persons had registered their vote. Mr. Ballard was the first upon the scene, and early in the day there was a strong contingent up from Elstree. Plenty of placards were displayed in the village, and in the evening the polling was more active. At eight o'clock the poll was formally closed and the boxes conveyed to the Workhouse, where the counting did not take place until the next morning."

The *Middlesex Courier* added: "The neighbourhood ... was all excitement on Monday ... every available voter was looked after, and the scene outside the polling station in Whitchurch Lane, towards evening, was very animated..... Placards around the neighbourhood were very conspicuous, and towards evening the village assumed an unwonted air of excitement."

<u>Note</u>: The Parish Meeting to elect councillors was held on 6 March at the Institute with retiring Edgware parish councillor Cllr. Frederick J. Allpress in the Chair during the election. The *Minutes* recorded that 36 ratepayers were present. A poll was demanded and resulted in the election of Johnson and Watkin Williams in place of Robinson and Kreitmayer.

The Returning Officer, F.J. Seabrook, took the view that the Parish Meeting was potentially invalid. The Parish Councillors Order (14 January 1901) and the Local Elections: Alteration of Dates Order (1901) specified that Parish Meetings called for the purpose of electing parish councillors should be held on 4 March. An application was made to the Middlesex County Council and a Special Order, giving retrospective validity to the Meeting, granted.

The voting figures for the poll were obtained from the *Hendon and Finchley Times* which did not mention Robinson as a candidate at the election: it is assumed he did not proceed to the poll. (Robinson's nomination, for the simultaneously held election of Hendon Rural District councillor for Little Stanmore, was declared invalid by the Returning Officer.) The turnout figure shown above has been calculated from the 146 valid votes cast in the RDC election.

<u>Note:</u> Cllr. Child proposed and Cllr. Burdett seconded that Scott-Moncrieff be chosen to fill the vacancy. There were no other nominations.

The reason for this casual vacancy has not been found, the *Minutes* simply stating in the entry for 28 March: "The vacancy on the Council having been duly declared...."

A detailed study of the *Minutes* of the Parish Council from autumn 1915 to spring 1919 suggests this vacancy was occasioned either by the resignation or the disqualification of Cllr. Sechiari, who attended his last meeting of the Council on 14 December 1915; there is no further mention of him in the *Minutes*. Death can eliminated as the cause: he placed a classified advertisement in the *Hendon and Finchley Times*, 31 August 1917, reading "Paul Sechiari, 'Erin', Edgware, Middlesex; 20 hens to be sold. 5s. each.—Apply, above address."

The poor record of attendance of two other councillors has been rejected as the reason for the vacancy. Cllr. Lavender attended a meeting of the Council on 11 April 1916 but no others afterwards. He was, however, reappointed an Overseer at the Council's 1917 Annual Meeting, held on 16 April (i.e. *after* the vacancy had been filled by the co-option of Scott-Moncrieff). Cllr. Halsey attended a Parish Council meeting on 19 October 1915 and was absent from subsequent meetings. However, on 25 March 1919 he was again in attendance. (This was the *final* meeting of the 'old' Council before the 'new' Council convened after the 1919 election, at which Halsey was re-elected.)

It is unclear why Lavender and Halsey were not disqualified and their seats declared vacant under the terms of the Local Government Act 1894, section 46, sub-section 7, for their failure, throughout a period of six consecutive months, to attend any meetings of the Council. It is possible they were engaged in essential war work or serving in HM Forces and may have submitted the reasons for their absence to the Clerk of the Council. If that was the case, and their absence was authorised by the Council, then they would not have been disqualified. It should be noted that no record has been found in the *Minutes* to support this theory.
