Note:

1973: Toms, the Labour Party candidate, was generally known by his second forename Keith. He believed that a similarity of names meant voter confusion artificially inflated Thompson's vote. Shortly after the election Thompson resigned from the Action Party and joined the League of St. George, an umbrella movement of the far right. He became the League's first leader when it was launched in 1974.
